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EDITOR'S OPENER

Dear Members & Friends, welcome to the May 2025 SRCC Newsletter.

Well, the AGM is over for another year, and thanks to the membership for the good attendance (around a third of the membership were present) at what is an important event in setting SRCC's course for 2025/6. More detail is given below under the *Previous Meetings* heading, but this is the right place to welcome Colin G4WEO who was elected to the Committee. We welcome him and hope he will find it an interesting & rewarding experience!

Most of us are aware nowadays of the risk of scams via the internet. I experienced one a year or so ago and would have been poorer by £120 if my daughter, who is made of sterner stuff than I am, had not intervened. Being now on my guard, I had another attempt a few days ago – but one with an amateur radio slant. Therefore, an outline is included here in case a similar thing is tried on you! Out of the blue, I received an email claiming to be form from an amateur in Newton Abbot whom I had not been in touch with for a year or two – I haven't include his callsign here. The email simply read "HI, Sorry to bother you, can we catch up on email for a few minutes? Derrick". My almost reflexive response was to respond saying "sure" – but on consideration it looked very fishy, and it seems almost certain that Derrick's email address had been compromised.

I didn't respond of course but contacted Torbay ARS suggesting they speak to Derrick in case he (quite an elderly gent) is unaware. The things that looked suspicious were:

- no header other than "HI"
- very little real information content (a) to avoid the sender risking compromising him/herself,
 (b) a scammer wouldn't know anything about me anyway, and (c) possibly, to promote interest on my part
- I was not referred to by name which one would expect from someone who knew me
- the request for contact by email to avoid issues of voice recognition
- sign-off with just the sender's name when one would expect any amateur to include a callsign (even though Derek's email address includes his callsign).

Obviously, every attempted scam is different but the above may suggest some things to look out for in potentially iffy messages – so to quote from Hill Street Blues (remember that from the early 80s?) "Hey, let's be careful out there!"

So, on to more positive stuff....

COMMONWEALTH CONTEST (CC) 2025 BY QUIN G3WRR

Regular readers may be aware that one of my annual Jolly Jaunts is to the Isle of Wight in March for the Commonwealth Contest. (We are no longer supposed to refer to it by its original (1931/33) name of BERU - British Empire Radio Union Contest - and who am I to argue with the RSGB?! The plan was to use the traditional cliff-top site near Brighstone on the South-West facing edge of the island with the usual rig (Elecraft K3) and N1MM+ logging program but with a bit of work on the antennas.

For the last few years, I have used a 14AVQ 40m-10m trap vertical for this contest with fairly good results. However, trap verticals appear to be designed to provide a good SWR on the bands they are designed for, with perhaps less focus on efficiency and gain. This is fair enough as any antenna design is a case of horses for courses. But on 40m the 14AVQ's length (18ft approximately) is about an eight of a wavelength (and on 80m - for which it isn't designed anyway - about a sixteenth of a wavelength). Bearing in mind the useful rule of thumb that a vertical less than a quarter of wavelength long probably isn't going to work too well, it seemed that some experimentation would be worthwhile.

Last year as an experiment in addition to the 14AVQ I had tried using a 30ft vertical on 80m & 40m, but its performance was disappointing and a decent SWR was not achievable. This year fiddling with the positioning of the mast and putting a dog leg in the driven element allowed just short of a quarter wave on 40m to be achieved: also, this year a set of quarter wave radials was added at the base. This seemed to provide a considerable improvement.

So off to Portsmouth for the ferry to Fishbourne at an unearthly hour on the Friday morning and, after crossing the Solent, onward to the site. Turning on my mobile on arrival (being from the generation for whom 100% mobile availability is not regarded as life critical) there was a slightly edgy voice message from my son asking if I had really meant to leave a "bit of antenna" by the dustbin at home. The answer of course was no. So, after saying "oh dear, golly gosh, how silly of me, never mind" (or something like that) it was time to unload the car.

This was challenging because the field was very wet, and Charlotte, the lady who runs the site, advised me to carry all the gear from the car park down to the chalet by hand. This was finally achieved, and it was time to see what could be done with the available bits of antenna. The 14AVQ (when all the parts are present) consists of five sections slotted together and fixed by Jubilee clips: the absentee was the fourth one up which included the 20m trap. As the fifth (top) section couldn't be added without the fourth being present, this meant it was limited to the bottom three sections. But nil desperandum - what was left worked as expected on 10m & 15m. So, all that was left was the need to persuade the 30ft vertical (based on a DX Commander collapsible fibre mast) to perform on 20m, 40m & 80m. Fortunately the auto-ATU behaved itself and a perfectly useable SWR was obtained on those three bands. The photograph shows the antenna setup (actually this picture was from 2024, but the only difference was that the 14AVQ - on the right - was about eight feet shorter this year!



After setting up the gear and a meal at The Three Bishops in the village it was time for bed. Despite having a good quality sleepingbag, it was seriously cold, and I ended up sleeping fully clothed plus an extra pair of socks and a woolly hat.

Up early (bright & early would be an overstatement...) on the Saturday morning for breakfast: catering was rudimentary with just two Bovril sandwiches and a Pot Noodle (but lots of tea) consumed during the whole of Saturday. The contest kicked off at 1000 UTC. The first 90 minutes or so were slow as always with mainly European stations (because at that time the sun is to the East) on 15m & 10m but also 7Q (Malawi), 5Z (Kenya) and VK3 (South Australia). From about 1140 15m opened to the West and from then until around 1830 most of the traffic was on 20, 15 & 10m to mostly VE (Canada – all call areas except 8) and the Caribbean but with some interesting ones including 6Y (Jamaica), 8P (Barbados), VP2M (Montserrat), ZD7 (St. Helena) and ZL (New Zealand). Around 1830 I went for a short doze (which turned out to be quite a long one). By the time I was back properly (around 2115).

the HF bands had slowed down but 40m had opened and was going well: there were also a few contacts were made on 80m too. At about 2330 the K3 started playing up (perhaps it was just tired...) and enough was enough so it was time for bed. I had intended to call it a day at that with 116 contacts in the book and pack up in the morning. But by around 0600 the cold woke me up and I decided to carry on for a bit. It turned out to be quite a long "bit" which lasted until 0915 having made a further 25 contacts, which included VP8 (Falkland Islands, quite rare nowadays) on 20m plus VK & ZL on 80m – which I think were my first ever contacts with those two DXCCs on 80m.

Packing up at the end is always tedious as the fun is over by then and you're tired (those who were at VHF NFD last year will remember the experience, but at least it wasn't raining on the IoW). But it was all finally done and back by the 1515 ferry to Blighty and home by around 1930. Unpacking was deferred until Monday...

My overall result was 140 scoring contacts in 16 DXCCs resulting in 11th position out of 80 entrants in the Low Power Single Operator Unassisted section. Alun G4WGE also took part in this contest from his father's site close to the River Severn in Gloucestershire. He made 216 scoring contacts giving him 27th position out of 85 in the High Power Single Operator Assisted section.

The following notes are provided by the entrants...

G4FFY: Activity in March on VHF included operating in the 2m and 70cm UKACs, 70cm AFS, 2m and 70cm FT8 contests, and the 144-432MHz March Contest. On HF operated in the 80m Club Calls SSB Contest, the March FT4 HF Contest, plus general HF FT8 operation. DXCC's worked stayed at 165 during March.

MOCGF: My March entry was cut short due to extensive garden work! Finally got round to getting it levelled and drainage plus more importantly all my coax and control cables nicely routed underground to the antenna site from the shack. So can operate without having to dangle wires through an open window! Plus managed to bury a fair few radials under the new turf. I now need to take the verticals down and adjust them as the radials have taken effect and tightened up the bandwidth. Managed to get a 2inch extension bracket and added a 6ft scaffold pole to the 6m beam so that's up at around 8m now. Hoping to give it a run out on the 6m UKAC this week.

I noticed from this location its quite quiet to the north, east and south, but beaming back through the houses which is west the noise comes up. Just hope it doesn't affect the USA direction, as my last place was the opposite to this, rubbish the the north, east, OK south and excellent out west.

G4FYF: Pathetic effort for most of March then fun with CQ <u>WWW WPX</u> contest over the last weekend added a bit of respectability. A simple, worldwide contest with loads of activity on all contest friendly bands. My highlights were Cayman Islands and Uruguay on 10m.

G3WRR: As usual all the contacts were contest based....in this case the Commonwealth Contest. Won't say much here as I'm aiming to do a separate item on it in this issue. The bad news is that there aren't that that many active Commonwealth countries left to work – but the good news is that some of the ones that do come on are quite exotic!

MOLEP: I'm a mite jet-lagged, having fled UK shores by air on the morning the clocks changed (which, of course, meant leaving for the airport an hour earlier) and then spent the best part of 17 hours travelling 15kkms to Perth WA for a family holiday with my sister. It remains to be seen whether I'll manage any radio time whilst here, but I have plans. With a bit of luck April's league table entry will contain contacts involving VK/MOLEP/P. Meanwhile, here is my somewhat minimalist entry for March. I did get on the air a bit, but only on 80 metres, and only in order to talk to folks in the home DXCC, and all but one of those contacts were not SRCC members.;)
