PREVIOUS MEETINGS

October A meeting (2th) This was the usual autumn Surplus Equipment Sale. In the absence of Gareth G4XAT (the usual auctioneer), the role was undertaken by Quin G3WRR – an undistinguished performance – aided by Pat G4FDN for the G3ENG equipment: Peter G3ZPB handled the financials. David G0PAR and Pat G4FDN had a fair amount of their own kit for sale, but the majority was from the estates of John G3ENG and Maurice G4DDY, the proceeds from the latter two being generously donated to the club. There was insufficient time for all the G4DDY gear to be offered and this will be carried forward to a later mini sale...see later. A total of £124.40 has been paid into SRCC's new Virgin bank account.

October B meeting (16th) This followed the usual B meeting format of Fix-it, Move-it-on and Social Chat, with test equipment provided by John G8MNY. The level of attendance was rather higher than during the summer months.

<u>November A meeting (6th)</u> "Adventures in Microwaves" by Gareth G4XAT, whose talks are always information-rich and carefully prepared. It will no doubt include some of the equipment he displayed at the Construction Contest last autumn.

November B meeting (20th) In addition to the usual B meeting format of Fix-it, Move-it-on and Social Chat with test equipment provided by John G8MNY, the opportunity will be taken to conclude the Surplus Equipment Sale with the equipment for which there was insufficient time to offer at the October A meeting.

<u>December A meeting (4th)</u> "The Metropolitan Police Communications Network" by Steve G3ZPS who gave us a presentation on "Vintage Radios" in September 2022.

<u>December A+ meeting (11th)</u> I have received the following from Chris M0TCH at Sutton & Cheam RS:

"Following on from last year's successful Inter-Club quiz, Sutton and Cheam Radio Society are planning to once again hold this event at 8pm Monday on 11th December 2023 at the 7th Banstead Scout Hall - post code SM7 1DA - detailed directions can be found at https://scrs.org.uk/wp-content/uploads/2019/09/Scout-HQ-Location.pdf.

The quiz questions will be more general knowledge, than amateur radio based, so it will be suitable for everyone. It's planned to be a lighthearted evening, with no entrance fee, or formal prizes, although the club will be providing some light refreshments (mince pies etc.)."

Chris has been notified that SRCC will be putting in an appearance again this year – and hopefully the weather will be better this time so that more of our members will be able to join the fun! Please note that the date doesn't fit in with our usual sequencing of meetings but is additional to them. If you are interested in attending, please let me know, ideally by third week November, so that I can advise Chris of likely SRCC numbers.

<u>December B meeting (18th)</u> This will differ from the usual B meeting format...as you may have noticed Christmas is approaching so we will be holding our usual Christmas Social. This will include mince pies, custard, other edibles (as yet unspecified to build up the excitement), teas, coffees, soft drinks and possibly even alcohol - all served up in tasteful plastic cups and on elegant paper plates!

RSGB AFFILIATED SOCIETIES CONTEST SERIES

Every year the RSGB runs a linked series of contests, currently eight, for its Affiliated Societies (of which the SRCC is one). These cover a range of bands and modes between 160m and 70cm, thus providing something of interest for a wide selection of amateurs. Their focus is on the performance of clubs as teams, rather than on individual "star stations". For this reason, club entries are based on teams of up to four stations. Clubs can enter as many stations as they like in each event, but their entries are grouped by the RSGB Contest Committees into teams of up to four. As SRCC is not a particularly contest-oriented club I am not aware of us ever having got more than one team on – however some of the more contest-active clubs have in the past managed to field up to five! Each of these contests stands in its own right, but in addition, the results of the individual contests are aggregated together by the RSGB (in a manner that is fair but not easily explained...) to form an additional and separate event – the AFS Super League.

This year (or, more accurately, this cycle since the series runs between late 2023 and early 2024) there are eight contests in the series, running between 70MHz AFS in September 2023 and 432MHz AFS in February 2024. By the time you read this, the first two this cycle will have taken place (with no entries in the 70MHz UKAC and two (G3WRR & G4WGE) in the 50MHz one). However, six contests in the current cycle remain, and the aim of this item – in case you hadn't guessed – is to encourage members to participate in one or more of them! This could either be full participation including log submission or just coming on to work other club members – but if you do the latter, it's generally regarded as poor form to work only your own members, so working a few other stations as well would be doing the right thing. Certainly, contesting is not to everyone's taste and there is no pressure at all on you to do so – but if you have a bit of spare time on the dates / times listed below, why not come on and work a few? You might find something new that you like within the hobby! The details of the remaining contests are shown below (2024 dates / times are provisional), along with a link to the rules:



NEW QRM DETECTED AT G7VAK

Expecting to hear a routine fair to strong 224 000 on the Sunday E07 0600z 03/09/2023, I was surprised to hear no E07 but 18s bleeps. I had previously seen a hint of it on XPB1 for both the Saturday schedules at 1100 and 1200z on the 10 and 11MHz frequencies were used but discounted it as crud.


E07 is a Number Station with female English voice that sends a null message as stated above. Its schedule being 0600z 9261kHz, 0620z 10261kHz and in the event of a message 0640z 11461kHz.

XPB1 is a data type signal which has more schedules than I can monitor; the two I monitor at the moment have schedules between +00 and +50m for Monday/ Saturday 1200 to 1250z and for Wednesday/Saturday 100 to 1150z. The longest send is 4m30s, the shortest so far 1m40s, weak sample from now defunct Sunday schedule:



XPB1 4467kHz


Well the sound file for E07 10261kHz 0620z 03/09 looks like this [the 9261kHz 0600z file looked the same too]:




E07

It needs no explanation.

A quick look across 7 to 30MHz revealed a structure between circa 8500kHz to 12000kHz:

12000kHz [yellow. The same image at the Red LF end] on the waterfall

That stretch of frequencies often appearing in RadCom [RSGB] in discussion of Broadband, ADSL or whatever its all called this week. Well, I suspect this new stuff is something to do with the latest innovation from BT/Open Reach or whatever they're trading as nowadays. A numbers colleague said to me "Less QRM if it goes to fibre....." I hope my reply then of, "We'll see, don't count your chickens..." doesn't ring true.



However, my Yupiteru 7100 and its trusty homebrewed RDF antenna pointed in two directions: Both towards distribution cabinets with a very low detection towards the telegraph pole outside my home.

Steve G4FYF comments: "Nothing spectacular for September. All 7 or 14 and one on 28".

Rick M0LEP comments: "[Our recent trip] to Germany went smoothly, but I didn't get any time to play radio, and I brought some sort of bug home with me, and have been spending most of my time in bed as a result. So far it hasn't given me a positive C test, and hasn't struck my XYL. Fingers crossed (or thumbs pressed, as the Germans say). This month's league entry is only very slightly better than last month's. I was still in Kenya at the beginning of the month, so six of the DXCCs came from there, and the rest (including Japan, for which my QTH seems to have quite a good short-path take-off) were SOTA chases from here."
